ANATOMY OF A FIGHT

James 4:1-12

4 What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you? ²You desire but do not have, so you kill. You covet but you cannot get what you want, so you quarrel and fight. You do not have because you do not ask God. ³When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures.

⁴You adulterous people,^[a] don't you know that friendship with the world means enmity against God? Therefore, anyone who chooses to be a friend of the world becomes an enemy of God. ⁵Or do you think Scripture says without reason that he jealously longs for the spirit he has caused to dwell in us^[a]? ⁶But he gives us more grace. That is why Scripture says:

"God opposes the proud

but shows favor to the humble." $\slash {\rm shows}$

⁷Submit yourselves, then, to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. ⁸Come near to God and he will come near to you. Wash your hands, you sinners, and purify your hearts, you double-minded. ⁹Grieve, mourn and wail. Change your laughter to mourning and your joy to gloom. ¹⁰Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will lift you up.

¹¹Brothers and sisters, do not slander one another. Anyone who speaks against a brother or sister^[4] or judges them speaks against the law and judges it. When you judge the law, you are not keeping it, but sitting in judgment on it. ¹²There is only one Lawgiver and Judge, the one who is able to save and destroy. But you—who are you to judge your neighbor?

INTRODUCTION:

Don't you find it interesting, that in one of the very first churches there were fights, quarrels and divisions?

Well, that is *exactly* what James if referring to;

"wars and fightings" going on in the church he was serving.

Although the actual meaning of the words James uses refer to wars, seditions and revolutions, the translation is not to be taken literally.

James is responding to and addressing the arguments and contentions taking place in the church and within the people of the church.

CAUSE OF FIGHTS:

One would think that fights within the Church would be extremely rare – if they even happened at all.

Well, let's take a look at the *cause* of fights.
Not just those that happen in church –
but the ones that happen in families and nations.

According to James,

the primary cause of fights and quarrels, is that someone or something is threatening our *perceived* happiness.

That's an important phrase, let me repeat it: something or someone is threatening our *PERCEIVED* happiness.

The word James uses for happiness is actually translated as "pleasures." From that word we get the English word *hedonism*, the worldly philosophy that the chief goal in life is pleasure. According to hedonistic philosophy *Nothing* can be allowed to stand in the way of achieving our personal pleasure; happiness.

- In the Declaration of Independence of the United States, it reads: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."
- It has become almost imprinted on our DNA that we have a "right" to be "happy" and a "right" to fight for that "happiness."
- Unless you are a Viking, a Mongol, or Irish, I don't think you can be "happy" while fighting.
- But we put such an emphasis upon happiness, that we are willing to go to great lengths to preserve it.
- Long before the Declaration of Independence, there were two brothers: Cain and Abel.
- You know the story: They were the sons of Adam and Eve. Cain was a farmer; Abel was a shepherd.

They both made sacrifices to God; and for reasons beyond the scope of this sermon, God favored Abel.

- Because Cain saw it as "unfair;" and because it stole his happiness, Cain murdered his brother, Abel.
- The concept of "warring" and "fighting" for our "happiness is as old as the Bible itself and continues to this very day.

On a global scale, a nation has resources that we want or need; a nation is causing us concern and anxiety – - and we go to war.

Political fights arise when we perceive that one party threatens to enact laws that we don't like. Not only do we turn against the party; we turn against each other!

We are inventive people. We can find the silliest of things to fight over.

For example, I know of instances where a person has broken fellowship with another person over which news program to watch. Really? Yes, really.

Unfortunately, that same shameful thinking has too often erupted in church fights.

Oh, my gracious! I have seen Church fights over the silliest of reasons.

One church I served had a parlor.

The carpet in the parlor needed to be replaced. A patron offered to finance the replacement IF we would make rules on who could use it and when it could be used.

Another church, again a fight over the parlor, several folks got really angry because a mother was using the parlor to change her baby's diaper during worship. Can you imagine how much time and energy was spent trying to referee those fights?

I vowed to <u>NEVER</u> serve another church with a parlor!

Then there are family fights. We've all had them. Our feelings get hurt . . . usually over something pretty silly . . . and we strike back.

When someone hurts us – steals our happiness –
we want to inflict the same amount of pain on that person; and we are not satisfied until we do.

That's a good time to stop and ask yourself: Which is more important: the relationship or winning the argument?

Are you willing to get things your way at the expense of the relationship?

If we look at the cause of a fight, usually there is a <u>perceived</u> wrong that we want made right ... a hurt for which we want justice ... a disagreement over a decision.

We fight because we want something and someone is preventing us from achieving whatever that is.

The root cause of <u>all</u> fights, therefore, is **Distorted Thinking**!

We relinquish control of our emotions and our actions to our ego – - we don't stop long enough to weigh the consequences. <u>CONSEQUENCES OF FIGHTS</u>: There are dire consequences to fights – - whether it is on a global scale - a political brouhaha - or a family squabble.

In a fight, there <u>are</u> going to be crushed egos. Someone must be a "loser." And it is a label that is worn like barbed wire! It hurts!

Take a look at what it costs in terms of lives and dollars to conduct a war!

What if we put those lives and those dollars to a better use – hospitals, schools, infrastructure.

All those things suffer when a nation goes to war.

Look at what it costs to run for a political office!

In 2013, the latest figures I could find, The average cost of winning or holding on to a six-year term in the U.S. Senate averaged \$10,476,451! That's 10 ½ million dollars!

The cost to be elected or re-elected to the U.S. House of Representatives cost an average of \$1,689,580.

And then – THEN – the majority of the time is spent arguing! Fighting because we cannot find a way to compromise. In our personal relationships,

we simply cannot fight among ourselves and not end up with strained relationships.

Each fight chips away at an ego, each fight leaches just a bit of trust out of the relationship.

We end up with a truce – - but a looong memory of the hurt that was dealt to us.

And the one consequence we seldom – if ever – consider . . .

... when we fight amongst ourselves we are also fighting God.

The truly sad thing about fighting against each other is all the consuming antagonism that builds to hatred is *exactly* opposite of the peace and love to which God calls us!

Fighting among ourselves drains the physical and spiritual energy from us so that we cannot pursue the calling to which God calls us.

How can you do mission work when you "hate" those you are serving or those you are serving with?

How can you share the gospel with someone you disapprove of? Or when you harbor hatred towards someone?

James refers to those embroiled in fights as "adulterers." By the Grace and invitation of God, we have a covenant with God; sealed by our baptism. When we cast God aside to pursue our personal pleasures, we are guilty of breaking that covenant. We are guilty of spiritual unfaithfulness – - spiritual adultery.

That's blunt and shocking. But it is true.

Jesus said,

"No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other." Luke 16:13

God calls us away from all that is evil; and our worldly – evil – desires keep us firmly anchored in the world of pleasure.

James says,

"... friendship with the world is hatred towards God. Anyone who deliberately choses to be "a friend of the world" by that choice "becomes and enemy of God."

CURE FOR FIGHTS:

In marital counseling,

I usually ask if the couple knows the best way to stop a fight.

So, let me ask <u>you</u> the same question: Do you know the <u>best</u> way to stop a fight?

The answer is right there in the question: You just <u>stop</u>!

There doesn't have to be a winner or a loser. Just recognize that what you are about to lose is far greater than what you might gain and stop!

Yeah, it really is that simple.

And it is very, very difficult to actually do. But that is exactly what we are called to do.

"Forgive others . . . as we are forgiven." "May the <u>peace</u> of Christ be with you."

We say it together <u>every</u> Sunday. Maybe we have said it so often that it has lost its meaning?

CONCLUSION:

God calls us – each of us – to a very high standard of wholehearted love and devotion towards God.

It is a goal that we may not be able to achieve on our own. But God gives us the *grace* to achieve that goal.

We live as faithfully as we can and when faith has taken us as far as we can go, then the Grace of God carries us the rest of the way.

That's why James says we are to "submit to God."

God is calling us to be willing to submit to God's desires for us rather than proudly and arrogantly insisting on satisfying our own desires for pleasure.

Before we look down on these people James is dealing with ... we must reflect on our own lives.

How easy is it to slip back into what we had practiced in our life before Christ? We must be awake to our new life in Christ. We must know that God called us to much greater things.

And, my beloved friends,

we can't do that if we are fighting with each other!
